Some notable work and recent results in the Leith Links area

- During the School Easter holidays there has been youth issues in the Leith area including some incidents of spitting. An investigation is ongoing and positive lines of enquiry are being followed.
- At the start of April, Leith Officers responded to reports of a male driving erratically. The vehicle was traced and the male was arrested for failing a roadside drugs wipe. Several other road traffic charges were libelled including no licence, no MOT and no insurance, and the male was released on undertaking.
- Leith Community Officers took part in the Hermitage Park Primary School 'Bike Bus'. This enables children to cycle to school safely together. The initiative is also supported by the Bike Station and will continue every Friday until the Summer holidays.
- Leith Community Officers and Special Constables deployed as part of NEST Guard during the Easter holiday. Officers were out on foot and on mobile patrol and managed to recover a quantity of controlled drugs from one person as well as seizing two vehicles for having no insurance.
- Work on retail crime in Leith has continued and further funding has been secured. Recently, officers carried out joint patrols with Scotmid security and arrested a prolific female shoplifter who was wanted on 7 warrants. The latest day of action involving plain clothes officers resulted in 5 arrests including two persons found in possession of knives.

Friday Night Lights

- Each week, Leith Community Policing officers work with Sports Scotland at “Friday Night Lights” youth initiative, to support reducing anti-social behaviour in the Leith area through a programme of activities and sports aimed at young people aged 9-12 years that were deemed ‘at risk’ of committing crime and/or antisocial behaviour.
- The initiative runs on Friday evenings, between 6pm and 10pm, which is a time traditionally associated with such antisocial behaviour.
- This initiative is run in conjunction with various community groups across Leith including YMCA Edinburgh, Leith Academy, Hibernian Community Foundation, Pilmeny Development Project and Lochend Football Academy.
- Participants have reacted positively to the initiative, and there has been a marked decrease in youth-related antisocial behaviour since the project’s inception.
